

How to conduct an ideal interview conversation?

There is a particular set of job related vocabulary that could score you high marks on the communication front.



Below we are going to discuss some of the common questions asked with the appropriate answers.Read on:

Interviewer: Tell me about yourself.

Tip: This question is asked to gauge your personality, upbringing and for learning a light bit about your background. Don't get too involved and emphasize for long on one particular aspect. Remember: Work related information and understanding your <u>English speaking fluency</u> is the central focus of this question.

Interviewer: What type of position are you looking for?

Candidate (option #1): I'm interested in an entry level position.

Candidate (option #2): I'm looking for a position streamlined with a growth in my past experience.

Candidate (option #3): I would like a position for which you think I would qualify.

Tip: You should be willing to give your employer a little say in the position he/ she thinks you are apt for. Of course, not comprising your expectation. Remember: Make sure to polish your<u>spoken English skills</u> to the optimum to not let your interview drop at any level.

Interviewer: Are you interested in a full-time or part-time position?

Remember: The English language could get tricky at such intense times, make sure to use it to your advantage.

Interviewer: Tell me about the responsibilities you carried out at your previous job?
