Example introduction

I am a creative content writer with five years of experience in managing all aspects of the content department – from ideation to implementation to publishing – for big corporate companies. I have spent the last three years developing my skills as a content head with XYZ Company, where I was appreciated for my team-management and creative concept development skills. While I am satisfied with my present organization, I would like to move away as the company's financial problems have raised a question on job stability. Hence, I have decided to start looking for new opportunities.
